Bottom Line:	<ul> <li>Polling is scarce here, though there are some indications that Mace's lead is narrowing.</li> <li>Ideological contrasts are particularly effective in GOP primaries, while touting superiority in the general election usually falls flat.</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>Touts he voted with Trump 94% of the time but supported Trump's impeachment.</li> <li>Weathering attack that he has enriched himself while in office.</li> <li>Reportedly reaching out to D's for support in the primary race to avoid a run-off.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Being attacked for missing more than 600 votes as a state legislator.</li> <li>Also depicted by Rice as a "tax and spender."</li> </ul>			
Bottom Line:	<ul> <li>Bottom Line:</li> <li>Recent polls show Fry leading, propelled by Trump's endorsement.</li> <li>Likely to go to run-off, favoring Fry.</li> <li>GOP primary voters are unlikely to forgive Rice for voting for Trump's impeachment.</li> </ul>
